The Impact of an Inter-Institutional, Interprofessional Networking Event to **Create Novel Collaborations**

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Purpose

- We hypothesized that an interprofessional networking event involving participants from multiple regional health centers and across two universities could facilitate the development of:
 - new interprofessional collaborations
 - o new inter-institutional interprofessional collaborations

among researchers, educators and clinicians.


Methods

Through a collaborative initiative between Duke AHEAD and UNC-Chapel Hill, a networking event was hosted at UNC for regional health professionals and health professions educators.

• An emailed pre-event survey collected:

- o demographic information,
- o attitudes towards interprofessional education (IPE) and practice (IPP) using validated tools (NIPEAS and ACE 15)
- o baseline data on participation in interprofessional collaborations and interinstitutional interprofessional collaborations.
- Impact was measured by paper survey at the end of the event and electronic survey 5 months after the event.

Results

- 37/42 registrants attended the workshop.
- **Pre-Event Survey:**

Conclusions

professional clinicians, researchers and educators from diverse backgrounds and different institutions may help break down professional and institutional silos and promote regional collaboration.

24 people completed the pre-event survey.

• Only 3 respondents reported interprofessional collaboration with parties outside of their own

• 29 people completed the post-event survey The majority of the participants reported they felt "moderately" to "completely" prepared to create new inter-institutional collaborations

o 6/14 respondents reported starting or joining an interprofessional initiative that they were not engaged in prior to the networking event. 4 respondents reported involvement in interinstitutional interprofessional collaboration.
